# I. Executive Summary

# Kiowa County, KS - 2015 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) Round #2

Creating healthy communities requires a high level of mutual understanding and collaboration among community leaders. The development of this assessment brings together community health leaders and providers, along with local residents, to research and prioritize county health needs and document community health delivery successes. This health assessment will serve as the foundation for community health improvement efforts for the next three years. The last CHNA for <u>Kiowa County KS</u> was published in May of 2012. <Note: The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) require not-for-profit hospitals to conduct a CHNA every three years and adopt an implementation strategy to meet the needs identified by the CHNA. > This assessment was coordinated and produced by VVV Research & Development, LLC (Olathe, Kansas) under the direction of Vince Vandehaar, MBA.

Important CHNA benefits for both the local hospital and health department, as well as for the community, are as follows: 1) Increases knowledge of community health needs and resources, 2) Creates a common understanding of the priorities of the community's health needs, 3) Enhances relationships and mutual understanding between and among stakeholders, 4) Provides a basis upon which community stakeholders can make decisions about how they can contribute to improving the health of the community, 5) Provides rationale for current and potential funders to support efforts to improve the health of the community, 6) Creates opportunities for collaboration in delivery of services to the community and 7) Provides guidance to the hospital and local health department for how they can align their services and community benefit programs to best meet needs.

<u>Key Community Health Needs Assessment Conclusions</u> from secondary research for <u>Kiowa County Memorial Hospital's</u> Primary Service Area are as follows:

KS HEALTH RANKINGS: According to the 2014 RWJ County Health Rankings study, Kiowa County's highest State of Kansas rankings (of 105 counties) were in Physical Environment, Morbidity and Social & Economic Factors.

- TAB 1: Kiowa County has a population of 2,523 residents as of 2013, a reduction of 2.1% since year 2010. 19.3% of Kiowa County's population consists of the elderly (65+), and over 23.6% percent of these elderly people (65+) are living alone. The percent of Hispanics and Latinos in Kiowa County is 5.4%. 22% percent of children in Kiowa County live in single-parent households. The percent of people living below the poverty level in is 12.3%. There is a high number of people with limited access to healthy foods (42%), compared to the Kansas rural average of 8%.
- TAB 2: Kiowa County per capita income equals \$23,136. The median value of owner-occupied housing units is \$100,300, higher than the Kansas rural norm of \$75,775. The percent of unemployed workers in the civilian labor force in Kiowa County is 2.6%. Kiowa County has a higher percentage of low-income persons with low access to a grocery store (41.7%), compared to the Kansas rural norm of 15.4%. The percent of solo drivers with a long commute is 12.9%.

- TAB 3: In Kiowa County, 31.1% of students are eligible for the free or reduced lunch program. The county maintains a 31.2% high school graduation rate, which is significantly lower than the Kansas rural norm of 84.6%. The percent of persons (25+) with a Bachelor's degree or higher in Kiowa County is 21.4%.
- TAB 4: The percent of births where prenatal care began in the first trimester in Kiowa County is 72.2%. The percent of births with low birth weights is 6.4%. The percent of birth occurring in Kiowa County where mothers smoked during pregnancy is 7.1%. The average monthly WIC participation rate in Kiowa County is 33.3%, higher than the Kansas rural average of 20.9%. The percent of WIC mother's breastfeeding exclusively in Kiowa County is 45.5%, much higher than the Kansas rural average of 14.6%.
- TAB 5: The ratio of the population in Kiowa County to primary care physicians is 2,338. The staffed hospital bed ratio in Kiowa County is 6%. The COPD hospital admission rate (94) in Kiowa County is much lower than the Kansas rural norm of 194.
- TAB 6: The depression rate for the Medicare population in Kiowa County is 13.4%. The percent of alcohol-impaired driving deaths in Kiowa County (25%) are lower than the Kansas rural norm of 36.4%. The percentage of people in Kiowa County with inadequate social support is 10% lower than the Kansas rural norm.
- TAB 7: The adult obesity rate in Kiowa County is 29%. The percent of adults who binge drink in Kiowa County (0%) is significantly lower than the Kansas rural norm of 16.7%. The percent of people in Kiowa County who are physically inactive is 27%. The population in Kiowa County served unaffected by SDWA Nitrate violations (58.9%) is much lower than the Kansas rural norm of 96.2%. Diabetes in the Medicare population is 17.3% and Alzheimer's disease or Dementia in the Medicare population is 11.2%.
- TAB 8: Kiowa County's local hospital charity care has gone down \$8,000 since 2012. The uninsured adult population rate in Kiowa County is 17%.
- TAB 9: Major cardiovascular diseases and diseases of the heart are the major causes of mortality for Kiowa County. The age-adjusted years of potential life lost due to traffic injury is 730, much lower than the Kansas rural average of 1541. The mortality rate in Kiowa County is 72.
- TAB 10: The percentage of infants fully immunized at 24 months is 70.8%, which is lower than the Kansas rural norm. The percent of diabetic screenings in Kiowa County is 89%.

<u>Key 2015 Community Feedback Conclusions:</u> Still a need for 1) Drug / Alcohol / Prescription Abuse, 2) Public HC Transportation, Home Care Services and Awareness of County HC Services Offerings.

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# II. Methodologya) Scope and Purpose

The new federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act requires that each registered 501(c)3 hospital conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) at least once every three years and adopt a strategy to meet community health needs. Any hospital who has filed a 990 is required to conduct a CHNA. IRS Notice 2011-52 was released in late fall of 2011 to give notice and request comments.

## JOB #1: Meet/Report IRS 990 Required Documentation

- **1.** A <u>description of the community served</u> by the facility and how the community was determined;
- 2. A description of the process and methods used to conduct the CHNA;
- **3.** The <u>identity of any and all organizations</u> with which the organization collaborated and third parties that it engaged to assist with the CHNA;
- **4.** A <u>description of how</u> the organization considered the input of persons representing the community (e.g., through meetings, focus groups, interviews, etc.), who those persons are, and their qualifications;
- **5.** A <u>prioritized description of all of the community needs</u> identified by the CHNA and an explanation of the process and criteria used in prioritizing such needs; and
- **6.** A <u>description of the existing health care facilities and other resources within the community</u> available to meet the needs identified through the CHNA.

Section 501(r) provides that a CHNA must take into account input from persons who represent the broad interests of the community served by the hospital facility, including individuals with special knowledge of or expertise in public health. Under the Notice, the persons consulted must also include: Government agencies with current information relevant to the health needs of the community and representatives or members in the community that are medically underserved, low-income, minority populations, and populations with chronic disease needs. In addition, a hospital organization may seek input from other individuals and organizations located in or serving the hospital facility's defined community (e.g., health care consumer advocates, academic experts, private businesses, health insurance and managed care organizations, etc).


#### JOB #2: Making a CHNA Widely Available to the Public

The Notice provides that a CHNA will be considered to be "conducted" in the taxable year that the written report of the CHNA findings is made widely available to the public. The Notice also indicates that the IRS intends to pattern its rules for **making a CHNA "widely available to the public"** after the rules currently in effect for Form 990. Accordingly, an organization would make a **facility's written report** widely available by posting the final report on its website either in the form of (1) the report itself, in a readily accessible format or (2) a link to another organization's website, along with instructions for accessing the report on that website. The Notice clarifies that an organization must post the CHNA for each facility until the date on which its subsequent CHNA for that facility is posted.

## JOB #3: Adopt an Implementation Strategy by Hospital

Section 501(r) requires a hospital organization to adopt an implementation strategy to meet the needs identified through each CHNA. The Notice defines an "implementation strategy" as a written plan that addresses each of the needs identified in a CHNA by either (1) describing how the facility plans to meet the health need or (2) identifying the health need as one that the facility does not intend to meet and explaining why the facility does not intend to meet it. A hospital organization may develop an implementation strategy in collaboration with other organizations, which must be identified in the implementation strategy. As with the CHNA, a hospital organization that operates multiple hospital facilities must have a separate written implementation strategy for each of its facilities.

Great emphasis has been given to work hand-in-hand with leaders from both hospitals and the local county health department. A common approach has been adopted to create the CHNA, leading to aligned implementation plans and community reporting.



# IRS Notice 2011-52 Overview

Notice and Request for Comments Regarding the Community Health Needs Assessment Requirements for Tax-exempt Hospitals

# Applicability of CHNA Requirements to "Hospital Organizations"

The CHNA requirements apply to "hospital organizations," which are defined in Section 501(r) to include (1) organizations that operate one or more state-licensed hospital facilities, and (2) any other organization that the Treasury Secretary determines is providing hospital care as its principal function or basis for exemption.

## How and When to Conduct a CHNA

Under Section 501(r), a hospital organization is required to conduct a CHNA for each of its hospital facilities once every three taxable years. The CHNA must take into account input from persons representing the community served by the hospital facility and must be made widely available to the public. The CHNA requirements are effective for taxable years beginning after March 23, 2012. As a result, a hospital organization with a June 30 fiscal year end must conduct an initial CHNA for each of its hospital facilities by June 30, 2013, either during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2013 or during either of the two previous fiscal years.

# **Determining the Community Served**

A CHNA must identify and assess the health needs of the **community served** by the hospital facility. Although the Notice suggests that geographic location should be the primary basis for defining the community served, it provides that the organization may also take into account the target populations served by the facility (e.g., children, women, or the aged) and/or the facility's principal functions (e.g., specialty area or targeted disease). A hospital organization, however, will not be permitted to define the community served in a way that would effectively circumvent the CHNA requirements (e.g., by excluding medically underserved populations, low-income persons, minority groups, or those with chronic disease needs).

# **Persons Representing the Community Served**

Section 501(r) provides that a CHNA must take into account input from **persons who represent the broad interests of the community** served by the hospital facility, including individuals <u>with special knowledge of or expertise in public health</u>. Under the Notice, the persons consulted must also include: (1) government agencies with current information relevant to the health needs of the community and (2) representatives or members of medically underserved, low-income, and minority populations, and populations with chronic disease needs, in the community. In addition, a hospital organization may seek input from other individuals and organizations located in or serving the hospital facility's defined community (e.g., health care consumer advocates, academic experts, private businesses, health insurance and managed care organizations, etc).

## **Required Documentation**

The Notice provides that a hospital organization will be required to separately document the CHNA for each of its hospital facilities in a **written report** that includes the following information: 1) a description of the community served by the facility and how the community was determined; 2) a description of the process and methods used to conduct the CHNA; 3) the identity of any and all organizations with which the organization collaborated and third parties that it engaged to assist with the CHNA; 4) a description of how the organization considered the input of persons representing the community (e.g., through meetings, focus groups, interviews, etc.), who those persons are, and their qualifications; 5) a prioritized description of all of the community needs identified by the CHNA and an explanation of the process and criteria used in prioritizing such needs; and 6) a description of the existing health care facilities and other resources within the community available to meet the needs identified through the CHNA.

# Making a CHNA Widely Available to the Public

The Notice provides that a CHNA will be considered to be "conducted" in the taxable year that the written report of the CHNA findings is made widely available to the public. Section 501(r) requires a hospital organization to adopt an implementation strategy to meet the needs identified through each CHNA. The Notice defines an "implementation strategy" as a written plan that addresses each of the needs identified in a CHNA by either (1) describing how the facility plans to meet the health need, or (2) identifying the health need as one that the facility does not intend to meet and explaining why the facility does not intend to meet it. A hospital organization may develop an implementation strategy in collaboration with other organizations, which must be identified in the implementation strategy. As with the CHNA, a hospital organization that operates multiple hospital facilities must have a separate written implementation strategy for each of its facilities.

Under the Notice, an implementation strategy is considered to be "adopted" on the date the strategy is approved by the organization's board of directors or by a committee of the board or other parties legally authorized by the board to act on its behalf. Further, the formal adoption of the implementation strategy must occur by the end of the same taxable year in which the written report of the CHNA findings was made available to the public. For hospital organizations with a June 30 fiscal year end, that effectively means that the organization must complete and appropriately post its first CHNA no later than its fiscal year ending June 30, 2013, and formally adopt a related implementation strategy by the end of the same tax year. This final requirement may come as a surprise to many charitable hospitals, considering Section 501(r) contains no deadline for the adoption of the implementation strategy.

# Year 2015 - IRS and Treasury Finalize Patient Protection Rules for Tax-Exempt Hospitals ACCOUNTING TODAY 1/2/15

The Internal Revenue Service and the Treasury Department have issued **final regulations** under the Affordable Care Act to protect patients in tax-exempt hospitals from aggressive debt collection practices and to provide other rules for charitable hospitals.

Under the **final regulations**, each Section 501(c)(3) hospital organization is required to meet four general requirements on a facility-by-facility basis: establish written financial assistance and emergency medical care policies; limit the amounts charged for emergency or other medically necessary care to individuals eligible for assistance under the hospital's financial assistance policy; make reasonable efforts to determine whether an individual is eligible for assistance under the hospital's financial assistance policy before engaging in extraordinary collection actions against the individual; and conduct a community health needs assessment, or CHNA, and adopt an implementation strategy at least once every three years. The first three requirements are effective for tax years beginning after March 23, 2010 and the CHNA requirements are effective for tax years beginning after March 23, 2012.

The ACA also added a new Section 4959, which imposes an excise tax for failure to meet the CHNA requirements, and added reporting requirements. These final regulations provide guidance on the entities that must meet these requirements, the reporting obligations relating to these requirements and the consequences for failing to satisfy the requirements. "Charitable hospitals represent more than half of the nation's hospitals and play a key role in improving the health of the communities they serve," wrote Emily McMahon, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Tax Policy at the U.S. Department of the Treasury, in a **blog post** Monday explaining the requirements. "But reports that some charitable hospitals have used aggressive debt collection practices, including allowing debt collectors to pursue collections in emergency rooms, have highlighted the need for clear rules to protect patients. For hospitals to be tax-exempt, they should be held to a higher standard. That is why the Affordable Care Act included additional consumer protection requirements for charitable hospitals, so that patients are protected from abusive collections practices and have access to information about financial assistance at all tax-exempt hospitals."

She noted that as a condition of their tax-exempt status, charitable hospitals must take an active role in improving the health of the communities they serve, establish billing and collections protections for patients eligible for financial assistance, and provide patients with the information they need to apply for such assistance. "These final rules adopt the same framework of proposed regulations but simplify the compliance process for charitable hospitals, while

continuing to provide meaningful guidance on protections for patients and requirements to assess community health needs," she added.

Under the new rules, hospitals cannot charge individuals eligible for financial assistance more for emergency or other medically necessary care than the amounts generally billed to patients with insurance (including Medicare, Medicaid, or private commercial insurance). In addition, every tax-exempt hospital must establish and widely publicize a financial assistance policy that clearly describes to patients the eligibility criteria for obtaining financial assistance and the method for applying for financial assistance.

Charitable hospitals are also prohibited from engaging in certain collection methods (for example, reporting a debt to a credit agency or garnishing wages) until they make reasonable efforts to determine whether an individual is eligible for assistance under the hospital's financial assistance policy.

In addition, each charitable hospital need to conduct and publish a community health needs assessment at least once every three years and disclose on the tax form that it files on an annual basis the steps it is taking to address the health needs identified in the assessment.

Many of the requirements have been in place since the Affordable Care Act passed in 2010, but in response to comments on the proposed regulations, the final rules also expand access to translations for patients, by lowering the threshold for having translations of financial assistance policies available from 10 percent of the community served as proposed, to five percent of the community served or population expected to be encountered by the hospital facility, or 1000 persons, whichever is less, according to McMahon. "The final rules also revise the notification requirements to maintain important protections for patients while making it easier for hospitals to comply with them," she wrote. "General notifications regarding a hospital's financial assistance policy must appear on bills and in the hospital. However, individual written and oral notifications of the hospital's financial assistance policy are now only required when a hospital plans to use extraordinary collections actions, such as reporting a debt to a credit bureau, selling the debt to a third party or garnishing wages."

While charitable hospitals must continue to make a good-faith effort to comply, the rules provide charitable hospitals with time to fully update their policies and programming to implement the changes. But if a charitable hospital fails to meet the consumer protection provisions required by the law, the hospital could have its tax-exempt status revoked. If a hospital fails to properly conduct a community health needs assessment or adopt an implementation strategy, an excise tax will apply, McMahon noted. "However, if a hospital fails to meet a requirement, but the failure is neither willful nor egregious, the hospital can correct and publicly disclose the error to have it excused, thus avoiding revocation of tax-exempt status, but the excise tax would still apply," she wrote.

**History:** Construction of Kiowa County Memorial Hospital was begun in 1948 with the total cost of the hospital being \$192,000. The hospital opened with 20 beds on March 7, 1950 with a contract with the Mennonite Board of Missions and Charities of Elkhart, Indiana to manage the hospital. The first medical staff of the hospital included: Edwin P. Deal, M.D. Florence Friesen, M.D. J.R. Bradley, M.D. M. H. Waldorf, Jr., M.D.

<u>The Tornado:</u> On May 4, 2007, the hospital was destroyed by an EF5 tornado. On May 21, 2007, the hospital reopened in a temporary tent hospital (Emeds unit) brought in by the Air National Guard, Topeka, Kansas. The ER was opened first and other departments were brought on board. August 1, 2007, we opened Greensburg Family Practice in a modular building. By December 2007, the facility consisted of 4 tents and 6 modulars. We offered onsite ER, acute inpatient, lab, X-ray, Daycare, administration, medical records, materials management, business office and maintenance departments. Ground for the new building was on October 28, 2008. Health Facility Group, Wichita, Kansas was the architect and Murray Group was the contraction manager. Open House for the new 50,000 square foot hospital and clinic was held on March 12, 2010. A retail Pharmacy was added to the hospital site in January 2012.

# c) CHNA and Town Hall Research Process

Our Community Health Needs Assessment process began in December of 2014. At that time an inquiry by Hays Medical Center (Hays, KS) to all NW KS Health Alliance Network member hospitals was communicated to explore the possibility of a "group buy" to meet IRS CHNA requirements. (Note: Most NW KS Alliance Network hospitals work closely with Hays Medical Center to provide onsite IT, Telemedicine, Mobile Radiology and Bio-Medical services. In addition, many Hays based specialists will travel to neighboring counties to provide visiting outreach clinics).

In late December of 2014 a meeting was called (hosted) by Hays Medical to learn more from the NW Alliance members (24) regarding their CHNA needs and to review the possible CHNA collaborative options. VVV Research & Development, LLC from Olathe, KS was asked to facilitate this discussion with the following agenda: VVV Research CHNA experience, review CHNA requirements (regulations) and discuss CHNA steps/options to meet IRS requirements and to discuss the next steps.

# **Overview of Town Hall Community Priority Setting Process**

At the end of each Town Hall session, VVV encouraged all community members to continue to contribute ideas to both hospital and health department leaders via e-mail or personal conversations.




CHNA's role is to identify <u>factors</u> that affect the health of a population and <u>determine the availability of resources</u> to adequately address those factors.









# **Demographics**

The population of Kiowa County was estimated to be 2,623 citizens in 2014, and had a 0.64% change in population from 2010–2014. The county covers 722.6 square miles and this area includes Lost Lake, Cradle Park, Kiowa County State Park and Washington Park<sup>1</sup>. The county has an overall population density of 4 persons per square mile. The county is located in South Central Kansas and education, health and social services, agriculture, forestry, fishing, hunting and mining are the most common industries in its economy<sup>2</sup>. The county was founded in 1886 and the county seat is Greensburg<sup>3</sup>.

The major highway transportation access to Kiowa County is primarily state and county roads. Kansas highway 183 runs North–South through the center of the county and Kansas highway 400 and 54 run East–West in the center of the county. The major U.S. interstate, I-70 runs North of the county and Interstate 135 is East of the county.



### USDA ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR THE CONSERVATION STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM

U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources
Conservation Service (NRCS) will make available \$100 million this year through the Conservation
Stewardship Program (CSP) and although applications are accepted all year, farmers, ranchers, and forest landowners should submit applications by February 27, 2015, to ensure they are considered for this year's funding.

CSP will also help broaden the impacts of NRCS Landscape Conservation Initiatives through a new pilot effort, which accelerates private lands conservation activities to address particular goals, such as creating habitat for at-risk species and conserving water. In Kansas, they include the Lesser Prairie-Chicken Initiative and the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative.

Applications should be submitted to local NRCS offices. As part of the CSP application process, applicants will work with NRCS field personnel to complete a resource inventory of their land, which will help determine the conservation performance for existing and new conservation activities. To be eligible for this year's enrollment, eligible landowners and operators in Kansas must have their applications submitted to NRCS by the February 27, 2015, closing date.

A CSP self-screening checklist is available to help producers determine if the program is suitable for their operation. The checklist highlights basic information about CSP eligibility requirements, stewardship threshold requirements, stewardship threshold requirements, and payment types.

According to Banks, the Regional Grassland Bird and Grazing Land Enhancement Initiative will receive funding through RCPP once partnership agreements have been finalized. With the funding, the KGLC, KDWPT, and partners will be able to create and implement management strategies that integrate habitat needs of grassland-dependent birds on grazing lands, maintain the tall grass prairie ecosystem, and enroll high quality grasslands into contracts.
